Local children participate in community consultation



The project team provided children and staff with an overview of the project. Children could look at visuals of other laneway examples. Children were encouraged to think creatively and consider all aspects of the laneway.



Children visited the laneway where the group discussed how the children and families currently use the laneway.



Children used ipads to take photos of aspects of the laneway they didn't like and felt could be improved.

Children discussed ways to improve the laneway and took notes of their ideas.

The group returned to the school where the students printed their photos from their ipads. On the photo children wrote/drew why they took this photo and what they didn't like.

A local artist facilitated a conversation with the children on their collective vision for the laneway design. This was captured by the artist as children described their ideas.

Children were presented with a certificate of appreciation and a Child Friendly City bookmark.

Decision makers listened to the views and ideas of children when planning for changes to public places and spaces in the municipality.

Children were kept informed of the design and project as it progressed. This included a subsequent visit back to the school to share the initial design concepts with the participating students.
